LIVING ABOARD A YACHT IN THE SAN FRANCISCO BAY – THE BEST OF BOTH WORLDS

On I'll start where the dream began, circa 1993. Michelle and I were dating in college in land locked North Carolina, and her family invited me on their vacation to San Francisco and Lake Tahoe to visit family. It was our first or second day,



and we were on a ferry over to Alcatraz and saw this beautiful sailboat with both sails up, cruising towards Angel Island, with the sun on it's side. We watched for as long as we could and said almost simultaneously, "wouldn't that be awesome"?

Through our courtship years, we enjoyed adventurous activities like rock climbing,

COAST GUARD AUXILIARY BOATING COURSE

Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla 1-9 will be offering an eight hour recreational boating safety class entitled *About Boating Safely* as part of National Safe Boating Week, which is May 16 to May 22. The class will be on Saturday, May 16, from 8:00 to 4:00, at the Sierra Point Yacht Club. Topics covered will include Introduction to Boating, Boating Law, Boat Safety Equipment, Safe Boating, Navigation and Boating Problems. There is no exam, but participants will receive a certificate of completion, which will provide the knowledge needed to obtain a boat license or safety certification in

many states. Many boat insurance companies offer discounts for completing this course. The cost will be \$30 for SPYC members and \$35 for non-members. This includes the book and certificate. RUN-UP BEER CAN RACING

First race of the 2015 season is May 5th at 6:00 p.m. Mark your calendars! This year we have 17 races scheduled from May to August, each one followed by dinner in the clubhouse.

For new participants there will be an introductory seminar Sunday, April 19th from 11:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

where we will review the racing program, the basic rules, and familiarize new racers with how to participate. If you are new to sailboat racing this will provide plenty of basic information to help you join our program.

All the race documents are posted on the club's website – click on "Racing" then "Information" to get started. As in the past, you must register this year even if you were registered last year. The rules are mainly the same as last year with the following notable changes:

- The split between the first race and the second race is now at PHRF 160. Your PHRF is based on the NCPHRF for your boat with some minor adjustments allowed based on information you provide on your registration form. Contact me if you have questions.
- There are 17 races number 1 (May 5) to 17 (August 25): spinnakers will only be permitted in odd

numbered races this year. See part 3.5 of the Sailing Instructions.

Please read the Sailing Instructions carefully; if you have questions or comments let me know.

This year I will be putting particular emphasis on two items:



- Finding places for people who want to crew but have no boat or have not crewed with our races before. We have the "Beer Can Racing Forum" that members can post a message to either asking for a place or asking for additional crew on their boats. You can access the forum from the "Racing Information" page at the website. Every year we have a few people show up looking for a boat to participate with and I plan to make a greater effort this year to place those people. If you have difficulty posting or are not a club member contact me directly and I'll post for you.
- Right of Way violations: Last year
 I had numerous complaints about

Right of Way violations, some against racers I considered to be experienced and knowledgeable. This year I will be more aggressive about following those up so if you think you have been affected by a violation talk to me after the race and I'll try to figure it out with you

as well as discuss it with the other boat. My approach is educational and cooperative and my goal is to improve understanding and communication between racers. More on this next month in the Spyglass.


